Letter from the Vicarage

March 24

Alleluia! Christ is risen!

Hi Everyone,

How are we all doing? I hope and pray that you are all keeping well and enjoying the Easter season.



Those of you who know me, or who attend church at all during the Easter season will know, how much I enjoy proclaiming those words: "Alleluia! Christ is risen". It is one of the privileges afforded me at the Sunrise service each year to be the first person that season to proclaim, the Christian faith and joy, that Christ is Risen! Alleluia!

Of course, at the time of writing, we haven't got there yet. We are still journeying through Lent, and (possibly) still observing those disciplines we felt called to follow through that season of preparation for the proclamation of those words.

I wonder how has your Lent been? Did you manage to avoid the temptation to give in on the disciplines you set yourselves at the beginning of the season? Or did your resolve crumble and turn to dust, almost as soon as the Ashen cross had been cleaned from your forehead?

And what now?

Will you try to continue any Lenten disciplines into the Easter season; make them a regular feature of everyday life, or are you more than happy to let them go for another year, as you truly embrace the joys and indulgences of the Easter season?

Personally, I have tried, to watch what I have allowed myself to eat, and particularly the stuff I regularly snack upon; and I have tried to read couple of books that at the beginning of the season seemed worth reading for my own development, and possibly too, as a betterment for my personal journey with God. *Continued...*

I confess that I got further with the one book than the other, and so will need to continue through the Easter season to try and carve out space to finish reading that one, and make some progress with the second.

The book I have made some progress with is called *The Seventh Story* by Brian McClaren and Gareth Higgins, and is subtitled *Us, Them and the End of Violence*. In it they posit that there are six default oppositional stories, synthesised as a means of keeping "our" stuff for ourselves, while preventing "them" from gaining more.

The stories are characterised as the *Domination*, the *Revolution*, the *Purification*, the *Victimisation*, the *Isolation* and *Accumulation* stories. In some respects these stories are responses to the stories that precede them: Domination and Oppression lead to Revolution; Purification blames and scapegoats and possibly eradicates a minority community; Victimisation demands vengeance; and so-on and so forth.

In each of the stories there is an element of "us" and "them".

In the seventh story, they state, that "human beings are not the protagonists. Love is." If we were to truly love our neighbours, rather than see them, as "them" in competition with "us", then we would be able to live without the violence that so mars our world at the moment.

This seventh story, of course, is encapsulated in the Easter story, which we celebrate during Holy Week and the Easter season. It is encapsulated in the stories of the early church in the book of Acts and in the definitions of Love that the apostle John writes of; both of which we hear in our bible readings, Sunday by Sunday though this season.

How might we live resurrection lives of love and community; forsaking the violence in our own hearts and minds? Setting aside our own needs to dominate and accumulate, in order to live in community and communion with our neighbours?

May God bless us all as we live Easter lives. Alleluia! Christ is Risen! Every blessing, Andy.



Bishop Martin asks, Can you help us improve safeguarding in the Diocese? Our work in safeguarding is being audited and the auditors would like to hear from you!

The safety of all those who wish to worship in our churches should always be at the forefront of our minds. That is true for those who work or volunteer in our parishes and also for all of us who work in a diocesan context. We are keen to ensure that we are doing all that we can to create environments where everyone feels safe, valued and respected.

The Church of England has commissioned INEQE Safeguarding Group to conduct a series of audits of dioceses to look at our work in safeguarding and suggest areas where we could make improvements. As part of this audit process, INEQE would like to hear from as many different people as possible from across our diocese and have put together an online survey through which individuals can comment in confidence about their impressions and experiences of safeguarding in the Diocese.

The surveys are both anonymous (the audit team are not seeking to identify individuals) and confidential (individuals will not be identified in their report). No one from the Church of England or any other body will be provided with or have access to survey responses.

Please consider filling in this survey openly and honestly and letting the audit team know your opinions. Our audit will take place from 1 July, but the surveys are open now and will close at 11.30 pm on Wednesday 1 May 2024 to enable the audit team to go through them. 

A time capsule in Malvern Priory

A time capsule has been placed underneath the new nave flooring in Malvern Priory.

It contains 77 different items including a letter to the future from the vicar of Malvern, the Revd Rod Corke, the master plan for the development of the Priory, the musical traditions involving the choir, the handbell ringers and the music groups, a copy of the church magazine and many photographs and details of the day-to-day workings of the church.



The nave floor is currently undergoing major building works to make it level. For the last 150 years the aisle to the altar has been flanked by wooden platforms, creating a safety hazard for users and limiting use of the space for community activities. The entire floor has now been excavated and under floor heating installed. The new flooring has been put in place this week effectively burying the time capsule.

The capsule, which is made of stainless steel and is the size of a large vacuum flask, was laid by two of the Priory's youngest members of the congregation, lolo and Martha who are both three years old. Together with 92-year-old fellow worshipper, Edwina Hawker, they placed the stainless steel capsule between the joists of the new floor ably assisted by our vicar Rod. The capsule was masterminded by Philippa Lowe, communications co-ordinator, who was given just two weeks to pull it together. "The idea came from our vicar, but we didn't have much time because the team working on the floor have been brilliant and have got on so quickly with the work. We've highlighted many of our activities and explained how the congregation raised a substantial part of the £350,000 needed. We've had lots of social events. Our vicar's wife Rita raised over £7,000 with a wing walk, members of the congregation took part in a variety show and we held an auction of promises. Everyone pulled together."

The capsule has a silicone seal which will last for around 100 years. Details of its placement will be recorded in the archives and also in the vestry so that on 10 February in 2124 it will be opened. "Who knows," said Rod "with people living so much longer it may well be lolo or Martha who open it."

The plan to level the nave floor has been in the pipeline for many years. If all goes according to plan the Priory will re-open for all its services and events by Easter. Currently the Sunday morning service, which attracts around 250 people, is being held at Malvern College. Other, smaller services still take place in the church.

Archbishops welcome publication of Future of Church Safeguarding Report

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York have welcomed the recent publication of the <u>Future of Church Safeguarding report</u> from Professor Alexis Jay, with an outline of next steps for how the Church responds.

Professor Jay, the former Chair of the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse, IICSA, agreed in July 2023 to develop proposals around independence in safeguarding in the Church. The work was commissioned following the termination of the contracts of the original Independent Safeguarding Board, ISB.

In a statement the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby and the Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell said:

"We thank Professor Jay and her team for this fully independent report, and the wisdom, expertise and meticulous proposals contained within it. We recognise her criticism of our safeguarding structures and processes, and we welcome this scrutiny and challenge.

"For the sake of all those who come into contact with the Church, particularly victims and survivors, we welcome the plans that are in place to take forward this work as swiftly as possible to give everyone confidence and trust in our structures and processes.

"Professor Jay rightly acknowledges the excellent work that is done up and down the country by experienced and committed Safeguarding Officers and others, but her challenge to us all is how our safeguarding structures and processes reach that same standard. This is a constructive challenge that we must all take very seriously.

The Church of England's lead safeguarding bishop, Joanne Grenfell, who is chairing the Response Group for the Wilkinson and Jay reviews said: "The report from Professor Jay contains important recommendations for the structure of safeguarding in the Church with a clear emphasis on independent scrutiny and the importance of independent professional advice in all our safeguarding work."

Richard of Chichester - more clearly, dearly and nearly

Ever wonder where the prayer ... 'May I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day' comes from? Richard of Chichester, a bishop in the 13th century, wrote it.

He began life as Richard de Wych of Droitwich, the son of a yeoman farmer. But Richard was a studious boy, and after helping his father on the farm for several years, refused an advantageous offer of marriage, and instead made his way to Oxford, and later to Paris and Bologna to study canon law.

In 1235 he returned to Oxford, and was soon appointed Chancellor, where he supported Edmund, Archbishop of Canterbury, in his struggles against King Henry III's misuse of Church funds. After further study to become a priest, Richard was in due course made a bishop himself. He was greatly loved. He was charitable and accessible, both stern and merciful to sinners, extraordinarily generous to those stricken by famine, and a brilliant legislator of his diocese. He decreed that the sacraments were to be administered without payment, Mass celebrated in dignified conditions, the clergy to be chaste, to practise residence, and to wear clerical dress. The laity was obliged to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days, and to know by heart the Hail Mary as well as the Lord's Prayer and the Creed.

Richard was also prominent in preaching the Crusade, which he saw as a call to reopen the Holy Land to pilgrims, not as a political expedition. He died at Dover on 3 April 1253. In art, Richard of Chichester is represented with a chalice at his feet, in memory of his having once dropped the chalice at Mass! One ancient English church is dedicated to him.

And, of course, he is author of that famous prayer, now set to popular music, which runs in full: "Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ for all the benefits thou hast given me, for all the pains and insults which thou hast borne for me. O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly and follow thee more nearly, day by day."

I thought that I would begin with a lesson in what can happen when words are abbreviated, such as on the following occasion:

There was a little old schoolteacher from England who was looking for a room in Switzerland and she asked a Swiss travel agent to help her. A place that suited her was found but she noticed that there was no mention of a bathroom or, as she called it, a water closet so she wrote to her travel agent to ask whether or not a WC was in or near to the house. The agent, who didn't know the expression, was puzzled by the abbreviation 'WC', never thinking that she was talking about a bathroom so he sought the parish priest's advice; they concluded that 'WC' must mean **Wayside Chapel** and responded by sending a letter to the lady (see the end of this article for the response that was sent)

Where is He Now?

Many of you who read this magazine will remember one of St Mark's former incumbents, the Revd Duncan Ballard, who moved to Tamworth in Arden and then on to Carsington Water in Derbyshire, seemingly getting nearer to Scotland where I am aware that he has a home. However, I was surprised to receive a copy of an article from the Glamorgan Star highlighting an art exhibition in the Holy Cross Church in Cowbridge, a small town between Cardiff and Bridgend that included a lovely photograph of Duncan who is the Cowbridge Ministry Area Leader. He is quoted as saying 'churches have always been places of beauty, tranquillity and creativity, and so it is fitting that we have offered space within Holy Cross Church for the inspiring artwork of the Cowbridge Arts Society'. Those of you who have lived in this area for as long as I have may remember a similar event that Duncan organised in St Marks many years' ago. He borrowed huge pieces of white plywood from the Cathedral to exhibit the artwork and it turned out to be very successful. However, it proved rather difficult to return the plywood from whence it came mainly because of the size and weight and the PCC had to be reminded on several occasions that the Cathedral wanted it all back; I don't recall how we got it down there!! If anyone is interested in reading the whole article, please get in touch with me. There is a picture of Duncan and it is agreed that he looks great so we are sending our Welsh

reporter to pay Holy Cross Church a visit and see if she can get an interview!

I have been invited to meet a friend in St Peter's Parish Hall to learn of the logistics involved, and find out how the money was raised, when a defibrillator was fitted in their community venue; this is with a view to having one installed in St Marks Church Hall. It is not going to happen overnight because there are all sorts of hurdles to get over before we can have one of our own, not least the faculty application. In preparation, we are launching the **St Mark in the Cherry Orchard Church Defibrillator Fund** and I have approached the hire centre and local co-op store who have both agreed to support the venture by having collection boxes on the counters. The Heart Support Group who use the hall once a month have expressed an interest in supporting the project and a recent generous donation to the church has been earmarked to add to the funds needed; I will endeavour to keep you up to date with the progress each month.

With the help of another donation, it is hoped to source a new roadside notice board because the clip boards on the current one are disintegrating. The silver backing is cracked and the plastic sheets that cover the posters constantly need replacing because weather conditions cause them to turn yellow and render them brittle. Several years' ago vandals 'popped' some of the rivets that hold the board to the upright posts, that are also showing signs of rust; effort was made to secure the board but it has failed and is loose again. First impressions are that a new one is going to be very expensive so if you are aware of a carpenter who could make one for us, please let me know; however, I do have a crazy plan B!!

Finally, cooking on gas again hopefully, by the time you read this edition, the new gas cooker, paid for with the **generous donation from Worcester Vigornia Rotary Club**, will have been installed by a registered gas fitter. Thankfully there will be no more burnt offerings from the old cooker which will not be going on the scrap heap.

World Autism Acceptance Week, 2nd – 8th April 2024

Autism is on the rise. Or at least, the recognition of it is. According to the website psychcentral.com, there was a 787% exponential increase in the number of people who were diagnosed with autism between 1998 and 2018 in the UK.

Appreciating Johann Sebastian Bach

Three hundred years ago, on 7th April 1724, the German composer Johann Sebastian Bach's *St John Passion* was performed for the first time, at a church in Leipzig.

It was put on as part of Good Friday Vespers at St Nicholas Church, having been transferred from St Thomas at the last moment by the music council. Bach, who had just turned 39, agreed to the move, while pointing out that the booklet had already been printed, there was no room immediately available for the musicians, and the harpsichord needed some repair. These problems were overcome.

Bach was already highly regarded, but primarily as a harpsichordist and organ expert. Later seen as one of the best composers of all time – renowned for such works as the *Brandenburg Concertos* and his *Mass in B Minor* – he was one of a large family of north German musicians. He is widely praised as a great synthesiser of styles and traditions.

The *St John Passion*, written during his first year as director of church music in Leipzig, was designed to be used as part of a church service. It follows John 18 and 19 in the Luther Bible, but the writer of the libretto is not known. A possible earlier Passion, written in Weimar, is lost.

Nowadays the *St John Passion* is heard mainly in the 1739–1749 version, which was never performed in Bach's lifetime, though he made many revisions to the original before his death.

50 years of ABBA!

Fifty years ago, on 6th April 1974, the Swedish pop group ABBA won the Eurovision Song Contest with their song *Waterloo*. It was the first time that Sweden won the contest. ABBA went on to be one of the most successful groups in music history.

The victory, in Brighton, was just the first step on the road to conquering the world, as far as pop music was concerned. The songs, written mainly by Björn Ulvaeus and Benny Andersson, were matched by the passion, exuberance and good looks of singers Agnetha Fältskog and Anni-Frid 'Frida' Lyngstad, who later married them – and even later, divorced them.

The name of the group came from the initials of the four Christian names. Some have suggested a link to the biblical Abba and looked for Jewish themes in their songs, but this is wishful thinking. While Anni-Frid (who was born Norwegian) may be Christian, Björn is definitely an outspoken atheist. In fact, ABBA is the name of a Swedish canned fish company that had to give permission for the singers to use it – a decision they are unlikely to have regretted.

Both *Waterloo* and ABBA achieved worldwide superstar status quickly – no small feat for a group performing in a language that is not their own. The film *ABBA* – *the Movie* and the musical *Mamma Mia* and its sequel, featuring their compelling songs, were huge successes. It is estimated that the musical has been seen by more than 60 million people worldwide.

ABBA hit the jackpot again when their revolutionary new project, *ABBA Voyage*, launched in 2022. In it, Agnetha, Björn, Benny and Anni-Frid perform their love-songs digitally with a live 10-piece band, in a purpose-built ABBA arena at Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park in London. Not bad for four divorcees in their 70s.
