Memories of Audrey Hardiker

A quiet and private person, well-known in the local community
Here is part of the text of the Vicar's address at the funeral in Fladbury on August 16th:

At Audrey's husband Harry's funeral in May of 2020, I began my address, asking those that were present, which would have been during the pandemic, to imagine a spider's web on an autumnal morning, I hope the analogy holds true



again today as we think and reflect on Audrey's life. The spider's web has a sense of beauty and richness about it, but its strength and its beauty are quite fleeting. We come then today wishing to honour and celebrate Audrey's life: to give thanks for her 89 years and for the privilege of being part of them. We come too into chapel this morning to give Audrey back into the love and care of almighty God.

Audrey was found, on the 21st of last month 'asleep in her chair' by Vanessa, the daughter of her cousin Pat, who had gone round to Audrey's house to investigate when people became concerned that they had not been able to raise her on the telephone for a little while. A post-mortem showed that Audrey had died from the combined affects of pneumonia and heart disease, and so had drawn to a close a life that had begun almost 90 years earlier on the 28th July 1935.

Audrey had been born to her parents Arthur & Phyllis Guise, when they were living in Hill End Cottage in Droitwich. We think that her schooling would have started in Droitwich and that Audrey moved from there to the High school in Bromsgrove. We believe she left school at the age of about 14 or 15, as typically people did in those days. The family moved from Hill End to a bungalow on the Droitwich Road. Unfortunately, Audrey's mother, became quite seriously ill needing Audrey to care for her until she eventually died in hospital. In 1957, Audrey was working at the Careers Office, when she met Pam who became a lifelong friend. In preparation for Harry's funeral, Audrey told me how Harry, was a founding member of Worcester Gliding Club, and how it was, that it was there that the two of them first met, in the late 60s. The couple married when Audrey was 36, at St. Augustine's church Dodderhill. I am told that they enjoyed going to the races and had shares in racehorses; and would often lay bets between themselves while watching the racing.

They didn't holiday overseas, particularly often, but Vanessa, tells me that they did on one occasion go Monte Cassino in Italy, to see the war memorial there which lists Audrey's Uncle, George William Harris, who died during that battle in the May of 1944. They used to have 3 retired greyhounds, Duncan, Zach and Sam who provided companionship, and of course necessitated walks down the lane.

Asked to describe Audrey I was told she was an honest and forthright person, a private person who was a wonderful cousin to Pat and an aunty to many. May she rest in peace.



Memories of Margaret Taylor

Whose funeral and burial, took place at the church on 17th August.

A familiar figure in the Village Here is part of the Vicar's address;

While we have come today to say our goodbyes, we have come also wishing to honour and celebrate



I had known Maggie, since we first moved to Worcester 9 years ago. She was one of those omni-present people in the village whenever I was walking my lad to school and Maggie was often taking Muffin for one of his regular walks, so I was very pleased to meet with her nephew Stuart, to learn more of her life.

She was born on 3rd April 1937 to her parents Cecil and Jeanetta Corsier, who lived in Coombs Road Northwick. Stuart tells me that although Maggie's Dad was very strict, Maggie was a proper Daddy's girl, who she could twist around her little finger! Stuart remembers meeting up with her on occasions, after he'd finished his day at school, for tea and cakes.

She met her husband Cliff when he worked for the Co-op. The couple married in 1970 - Stuart remembers being a page boy and having something of a wardrobe malfunction on the day, when he managed to rip the buttons off his shirt! When they were first married the couple rented a room in Old Road, Whittington, before moving to the house in Church Terrace. Although not having any children of their own Maggie made up for it by doting on her nephews, Anthony and Stuart. Anthony, 10 years Stuart's senior, was taught by Maggie how to play the piano. Stuart has very fond memories of being with Maggie, going on holiday with them to Yeovil and elsewhere. Of course for many of us our abiding memories of Maggie would always be her with Muffin. Though Muffin was just the last in a long line of poodles that they owned: Mandy, Honey, Teddy and Tinker being those that Stuart could remember. Maggie and Cliff liked to go out for a drink together and frequently joined the rest of the family after choir practice at the St.

Stephen's Working Mens Club, and Stuart remembers that Maggie would frequently order a Guinness or a Stout, before taking the froth off the top with her finger and getting whichever dog to lick it off. Cliff was something of a heavy smoker and developed cancer which Maggie nursed him through until he sadly died on Christmas Day in 2009.

Asked to describe the kind of person Maggie was, Stuart told me she was a happy soul, always ready to help others. May, she rest in peace.



Quiet Music for a Summer Afternoon

We were delighted to welcome back Joanne Jefferis and Mike Elden for their 'cello and piano recital on Sunday afternoon 10 August, with Archdeacon Robert Jones expertly turning the pages. The full audience was treated to a dozen varied pieces of light classical music, followed by

the opportunity to mingle and catch up over home-made refreshments served in the Elizabethan Room, in perfect weather.

Some pieces were by well-known composers including Elgar, Dvorak, Strauss and Verdi, while others were new in the musicians' repertoire, and Joanne introduced us to each one. She plays a very special English 'cello made in London about 1790 which has a truly mellifluous tone, while Mike's accompanying is most sensitive. A number of Joanne's adult students were present who very much appreciated her superb tuning and technique in some complicated arrangements while Mike accompanied with fiendish skill in the fast sections.

The concert ended with *Summertime* and *Promenade* by Gershwin, and then the enthusiastic applause persuaded Joanne and Mike to add Saint-Saens' serene *The Swan* as an

encore. The musicians vey generously donated their services in aid of the charity *Mentorlink* and church funds.

by Denys Bielov - 7 Stars of bright people

The first thing we did was to write a post on social media to find a visa sponsor in the UK. I added photos before and after the occupation. And soon a Ukrainian, Iryna, in England, called me on WhatsApp. Later she was replaced by her, Olena, from Worcester-



shire County Council, who helped me a lot. Iryna told me that there was already a family in Worcester that was ready to accept me: Joe and Ella and their children Nina and Dylan. In December 2023 we exchanged our first video messages. I had not seen such warmth and generosity in people's eyes for a long time. Joe even praised my English! Ella made a video tour of their wonderful cosy house and introduced me to the children. They were so hospitable, as if we had known each other for a long time. They were ready to invite a stranger from another part of the planet into their home.—I told myself "For us Slavs, this is probably some kind of simply divine kindness and trust". I became convinced that the English were angelically kind. I shared my plans with Katya, a friend from Kyiv and also my classmate from the academy. Katya called all her friends to help in any way they could. And from time to time, I started to receive 50, 100, 500 and even 1500 hryvnias on my card (1 hryvnia = £0.02).

I looked for people to help me get out of Mariupol. And here, too, I was fabulously lucky! My friends, who managed to escape to Berlin at the beginning of the invasion, gave me a link to a team called Rubikus, which helped evacuating people from the occupied territories of Ukraine. They were awesome guys! Unfortunately, I cannot publish many details of my preparation and the road through the Russian Federation while the war continues, otherwise I might inadvertently put those who helped me in danger. Tanya, Katya, the Rubikus team, Arseny and his team of students, Joe and Ella and their children, friends in Berlin, Olena and Iryna were like stars gathered together guiding my path.

My three-steps plan. - The first was to get to Great Britain to Joe and Ella.

- The second was to integrate and become useful to British society, to find friends and like-minded people, to find paid employment and to use part of my earnings to help our warriors and to spread the truth about what is happening in Ukraine and Mariupol.

Continued.....

The third was to return home after the war and help develop relations between Ukraine and Britain and restore my country and city of Mariupol. No one knows when and how this war will end and to what city I can return. Of course, I would like to return to liberated Ukraine and Mariupol. However, now I know exactly what to live for.

Let's go!

Early in the morning of 19 January 2023 I took a bus to Rostov-on-Don. It was hard to say goodbye to my home and the city where I was born, grew up, and where a part of my soul remained. It was especially hard when you know that you may never return. And what if something goes wrong? But I knew exactly where I was going and why. If I got to Britain, I could do a lot more to help Ukraine win than if I stayed. I was also warmed by the thought: "I'll come back again, my dear Mariupol. And I will rebuild you again under the blue-yellow flag of free Ukraine". When we arrived at the Russian border checkpoint, everyone was taken to the waiting room and our passports were taken away for a couple of hours to be checked. Of course, I, like everyone else, gave my Russian passport. I had to take it, because without it the risks of being arrested on the territory of the Russian Federation were great. Fortunately, I was let through without interrogation. And when we finally got on the bus, I felt that the first barrier had been passed. The part about my time spent in Rostov has also been omitted for security reasons.

The people on the train were quite different from those in Rostov, because they were mostly Belarusians who were going to their homes. They are more open and cheerful than the Russians. I tried not to talk to them. Neighbouring passengers more than once offered me a drink of alcohol, but I politely declined, explaining that I was not allowed for religious reasons. The Russian border guards walked around the carriage with service pistols, and the Belarusian ones had automatic rifles and dogs. Everything went smoothly! I had to wait another eight hours at the railway station to take the next train to a small town on the Belarus-Polish border. Waiting there was a group of Ukrainian refugees from the occupied territories. And here at last I could breathe more easily, because I felt that I was among friends and wanted to talk to someone. Mostly there were people from the south of Ukraine and from Crimea. Everyone was going to Poland, and then to wherever they could. One woman became agitated: "What about going back? I have a lot of valuable things left at home, and my home animals!". I was saddened that after what had happened there were still Ukrainians who did not realise what was happening. I also had a lot of valuable things left in Mariupol. But I knew it was time to say goodbye at least until victory.

Our wonderful Diocese *from*The Archdeacon of Dudley, Nikki Groarke,

Back in June I had the immense privilege of being part of the Crown Nominations Commission (CNC) responsible for discerning who our next Bishop of Worcester should be. I am delighted by the outcome,



and am looking forward immensely to serving alongside Bishop Hugh when he comes to join us in the new year.

A question posed during that process caused me to reflect on what I have learned about the Diocese of Worcester during the episcopal vacancy. Let me share a few of my observations.

In the Statement of Needs, describing the diocese for potential future bishops, we named our key characteristic as being **relational**. Relating well to one another across different traditions and contexts is part of Bishop John's legacy. What has really encouraged me, is that a year on, it is still a core part of who we are. Even during this season of change, with the natural uncertainty that comes during a vacancy, we have continued to relate well, bound together by our common commitment to be kingdom people.

Our transformation journey is exciting, and is bearing fruit as churches become healthier and more sustainable, we see more children and young people being reached, and new disciples formed and nurtured. Each of the candidates we interviewed was inspired by our vision and impressed by progress so far, and I don't think that's just because they were hoping to make a good impression! The clarity of our long-term plan, our clear priorities and the way we were able to engage people across the diocese in conversation have been praised by the national Vision and Strategy Team who often point others to us for advice on how to do it well. It was clearly a key factor in drawing potential candidates to explore whether they might be called to serve here.

We **navigate difference** well. The CNC process has been complex and divisive in some dioceses, and in a couple of cases members were unable to coalesce around a nomination. We worked really hard with the wider Vacancy in See Committee, and then as a group of six reps together with the national CNC members, to build consensus by committing to open and transparent dialogue, careful listening to build shared understanding, and prayerful discernment.

We related carefully across our differences because we each trusted in a shared goal of finding the absolute best person under God to be our next bishop. I felt proud of how we had conducted ourselves, and came away with renewed hope for the future and an even stronger conviction that Worcester is the best diocese in the world to be part of!

I hope you will join me in your parish in praying for Bishop Hugh over the coming months as he prepares to come and join us on our transformation journey, and begins to build relationship with the varied and wonderful people across this fabulous diocese.



Celebrating 200 years of the public railroads


Two hundred years ago, on 27th September 1825, the world's first public railway opened. It was the Stockton and Darlington Railway in north-east England. Inspired and supported by a prominent Quaker, Edward Pease, and backed financially by many Quakers nationally, it has been described as "the great theatre of railway operations", sparking the explosion of railways across the world and boosting the industrial revolution. About 20 miles of the original 25 mile stretch still exist, now as part of the Northern Rail line.

The technical expertise behind it all came from George Stephenson, an extraordinary self-taught engineer whose expertise, which originated in the mines, stretched beyond railways. His *Locomotion No 1*, built for the Stockton and Darlington line, was the first steam locomotive to carry passengers on a public rail line. He worked with his 18-year-old son Robert, who is known for creating the more famous *Rocket* four years later.

The first Stockton and Darlington train – which in fact ran from Old Etherley Colliery, some distance north of Darlington – was led by a man on horseback with a flag. The motto of the organising committee was "At private risk for public service". With brakemen stationed between the wagons, the train reached 12 to 15mph and was greeted by an estimated 10,000 people at the Darlington junction, where some passengers left and more boarded. The average speed was calculated at about 8mph. Six wagons of coal were given to the poor by way of celebration.

A nine-month festival in County Durham and the Tees Valley – with artwork, spectacles and community events – is marking the bicentenary of the opening of the railway. As a tribute to his life and achievements, a bronze statue of George Stephenson was unveiled at Chesterfield railway station in 2005. An earlier statue stands in Neville Street, Newcastle.

Remembering Albert Schweitzer

Sixty years ago, on 4th September 1965, Albert Schweitzer, German-born French theologian, philosopher, organist, physician and missionary doctor to Africa, died. He was winner of the 1952 Nobel Peace Prize. Schweitzer was a devout Christian with a passionate allegiance to Jesus. His key philosophy was "reverence for life": no-one, he felt, should harm or destroy life unless it was absolutely necessary. It was this philosophy that gained him the Nobel Peace Prize, and led him in later life to campaign against nuclear weapons.

He was born in 1875 in Alsaçe, where his father was a Lutheran-Evangelical pastor, and he made an impression first in the world of music, becoming a musical scholar and organist, as well as dedicating himself to the restoration and study of historic pipe organs. In 1903 he became Principal of the Theological College of Saint Thomas, from which he had graduated. In 1906 he published his key work, *The Quest of the Historical Jesus*, which was published in English in 1910.

Schweitzer made a proposal in 1912 to work at his own expense as a physician in the Paris Missionary Society's mission at Lambaréné on the Ogooué river, in what is now Gabon, in Africa, then a French colony. He would not go before a committee to have his doctrine examined, but met committee members individually and was eventually accepted, raising his own funding partly through concerts. His wife, Helene, served as an anaesthetist for surgical operations.

There was some criticism much later of the informal, spartan arrangements (patients living on the hospital grounds during treatment, for instance), but his biographer — also a volunteer surgeon — pointed out that surgical survival rates were as high as in many fully equipped western hospitals. Schweitzer died at Lambaréné, his grave marked by a cross he made himself.
