



## Letter from the Vicarage October 25

Hi Everyone,

How are we all doing?



Words from our communion service, which we say at the offertory, when we bring our gifts to God's table - gifts both of money, and of bread and wine, to be shared amongst us all. This is a prayer of both praise: "Blessed are you Lord God ..." and of thanksgiving "... through your goodness we have this bread ...".

This month we celebrate our service of Harvest Praise and Thanksgiving. How thankful are we? Much of what we have and are given, we take for granted.

We moan about our climate and our weather. There is a shop in Keswick, in the Lake District, that proclaims from it's windows that "there is no such thing as bad weather, just the wrong clothing." That may be true, when it comes to being outdoors in our work or leisure time, but the right kind of clothing, is not going to afford the farmer the protection they want for their crops. It's not going to help the abundance or otherwise of the harvest.

I have lost track a bit at the moment, as to how good or otherwise our harvest is expected to be this year. I know that it is early because of the hot weather; but at the beginning of the spring, following the rain and the flooding there was probably a degree of concern about whether it was going to be possible to plant the seeds in good time for them to grow and be harvested. *Continued....*

Maybe there was a feeling that there was no point in actually sowing the seeds.

Those feelings seem to have been replaced by relief that the warmer weather when it arrived did so for a longer period than we have been used to in recent years, and may therefore result in a better harvest than was at first feared. Or it may be that, that wet and cold start and hot summer has meant a good harvest for certain crops and a poorer harvest for others less suited to those conditions.

Nonetheless, let us thank and praise God for His bountiful goodness. Let us praise and thank God, for the industry of our food producers and suppliers.

But what of our own harvests? The fruit of each of our labours?

I occasionally use a form of prayer, just before lunch, which asks God to "prosper thou, the work of my hands". With it I can entrust into God's hands the meetings, the conversations and the ministry that I have sought to give and receive that morning. I will have spoken words, but can never be sure whether they have been heard as I meant them to be. More importantly, I cannot be sure that they have been said and heard in the manner that God meant them to be. All I can do is place them into God's hands and ask that he "prosper them". Equally, by that same prayer, I invite God to be part of the ministry that I will seek to give and receive for the rest of that day.

Can I judge the success or failure of that work? Not easily. But I can give thanks to God, for past blessings and in faith trust to Him to prosper the work of my hands.

What will your prayer be this harvest time?

### Prisons Week from 12 to 18 October.

"You learn about society by seeing how people are treated in its prisons, and it's an absolute mess in ours. The prison system is insanely broken — people here are not treated like human beings. The maximum emphasis is on punishment with only superficial mention of rehabilitation. Many resort to smashing the contents of their cells or self-harming as a way to access help. It is absolutely no wonder that re-offending rates are so high when those leaving prison are in a worse way than when they came in. Whatever stability people had in their lives before prison, whether it's housing or employment, is ripped away when you step inside and there is minimal help to put things back together".

These are the views of a 24-year-old man in prison for the first time who is serving two years for political activism.

Prisons' Sunday on 12 October marks the start of the annual week of prayer to raise awareness of issues faced by those affected by the criminal justice system. It will be marked, as usual, in the Cathedral with the diocesan Criminal Justice Affairs Group (CJAG) having an input in this morning's service.

On Prisons' Sunday and throughout the rest of the week, we pray not only for offenders and victims of crime (recognising that many people in prison are both) - we pray also for families, friends, prison staff, chaplains, police, probation and all who make decisions which impact people's lives. We are all created in the image of God who came to earth to be with us and to enter into our pain and suffering as well as our joys and delight. We will pause to reflect on Jesus Christ's encounters with people when he walked on earth, and his compassion, always offering hope and the possibility of transformation even in places of suffering.

Lord, you offer freedom to all people. We pray for those in prison. Break the bonds of fear and isolation that exist. Support with your love prisoners and their families and friends, prison staff and all who care. Heal those who have been wounded by the actions of others, especially the victims of crime. Help us to forgive one another, to act justly, love mercy and walk humbly together with Christ in his strength and in his Spirit, now and every day. Amen

I continue to be so proud to be leading such a fantastic school with amazing support from our parents and community. We also have some exciting Christmas events being planned, which we will be sharing with you very soon.





### Escape from Mariupol by Denys Bielov - 8

I had to wait eight hours at the railway station to take the train to the Belarus-Polish border. On 23 January 2023 we passed the Belarusian border. That was a dangerous moment. I was almost deported back to Mariupol and an interrogation centre of the FSB (the KGB in Soviet times). They nitpicked that my passport was damaged. I got it in 2001, and it



had lived through a turbulent student life. But mercifully they decided to let me pass. I tried not to show too much joy. Inside, I was jubilant: "It has happened!" I didn't believe that I would be able to escape, because the screening conditions were becoming stricter. I told myself, 'Don't rush to rejoice, you're not even halfway there yet."

The Polish border guards were delightful! They scanned our luggage and examined our Ukrainian passports. They let us through without questions. Late in the evening, we were all exhausted, but happy, and went by bus to Warsaw. We stopped at a petrol station and had a bite to eat in a café. Everything felt like freedom. I was surprised that my Ukrainian bank card worked when I paid at the checkout. From then on, the help of my friend Katya, became vital! Everything was expensive in Poland. 'I need to earn money,' flashed through my mind, 'but first I must get to Britain.' At the petrol station, we were able to exchange Belarusian roubles for Polish zlotys. I had already got rid of my Russian roubles in Belarus.


At 11pm, we arrived in Warsaw: four days journey from Mariupol. We were taken to the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC), a temporary camp opposite the bus station. There were several facilities including toilets and first aid and administration. There were also several large tents where one could make a cup of aromatic coffee and a canteen. Refugees were provided with free assistance: food, hostel accommodation and help with travel documents and registration. The people who worked there were very caring towards the new arrivals.

In my hostel room, there were two guys, Kolya and Zhenya, refugees from south Ukraine who did not hide their gladness about their escape. We quickly became friends. They cheerfully discussed their adventures during the occupation and their journey. Unlike me, they had already had international passports obtained before the war when it was very simple to do.

In any Ukrainian city where there was an Administrative Services Centre (ASC), you could very quickly go through the process and get an international passport within a few weeks. I was really regretting that I didn't do it then. Although my Mum told me about it many times:

"Come on Son, why don't you get yourself an international passport? It only costs a couple thousand hryvnias and takes a few hours, and in a few weeks you'll be able to pick up your documents and travel wherever you want."

"Well, Mum, I'm not going anywhere right now. I'm happy here, we have everything we could possibly want in Mariupol. I really enjoy spending my holidays here with you in our nice



Before the war I was completely carefree. In 2019, I did seriously think about getting an international passport. I was in a very happy relationship with a charming lady from Dnipro. I really wanted to take her on a trip to France, Italy or Turkey. But our romance ended much faster than I could earn enough money. I even planned to buy wedding rings and make a surprise proposal to her during the trip. But that was not to be. She fell in love with someone else. I let her go without any scenes of jealousy. Although I was very depressed and it seemed this was the greatest tragedy of my life. But compared with the terrible upheavals I would experience three years later, this unhappy time seems only a minor annoyance. I no longer wanted to get an international passport. My stubbornness was fuelled by my friend's words: 'There is no better sea in the world than ours — the Sea of Azov!' 'Why should I travel anywhere else when our sea is the most awesome!' Later, I will tell you how beautiful Mariupol was.

In 2020, my mother was diagnosed with leukaemia. My sister and I took her to Dnipro, and one of the best oncology centres. She underwent many tests and was prescribed chemotherapy. She felt well and loved to walk around the city, swim in the sea and go to our elegant Drama Theatre. Annually, she had to undergo tests to adjust her treatment. We decided that I would move to Mariupol to live with her. Thoughts of an international passport were forgotten. After all, I understood that my mother could not be left alone even for a week. Life in Mariupol was fulfilling! My Mum died on 8<sup>th</sup>. October 2022. Now I remember that life as a wonderful dream.

We're considering holding some focus groups to explore the results of our recent consultation and to get more detailed views on the future of our changing and growing parish.



### Listening?

While visiting a cathedral recently, I couldn't hear the service over the chatter of the two people sitting in front of me. Finally, I tapped one of them on the shoulder. "Excuse me," I said, "I can't hear." The reply was swift and indignant. "I should hope not! This is a private conversation."

### Finding Fanny Clifton's grave at Whittington

As new Trustees of the Elizabeth Stephens and Fanny Clifton Charity we have been keen to find the benefactors' graves. We knew from the 'History of Whittington' book Fanny Clifton was buried in Whittington churchyard in 1888 and so Helena Bennett contacted the church to ask about burial records. She was told of the general area of Fanny's grave, which apparently is close to a well-established holly tree, but was a tangle of brambles and thick ivy. Over a period, Helena visited the church yard and gradually made headway putting in hard work and determination cutting away thick undergrowth, but unfortunately only found graves that had such weathered faces their epitaphs are lost. She began to fear that we might never find Fanny's grave.

However, on a sunny afternoon in early September, after finishing arranging flowers inside the church I came outside and found Helena on her knees behind the compost heap, carefully tugging away a carpet of ivy and earth from a flat gravestone. She had revealed the top third of the stone and as she rubbed away the mud, she saw the name Captain Fredrick Clifton – and we both started to get excited. Clearing away more years of soil entangled ivy she read out 'John Hill Clifton', who we knew was Fanny's older brother. We were close to finding Fanny's memorial!

Helena pulled and peeled back the final area of what almost looked like an ivy peat entwined blanket and there at the bottom of the flat stone, was Fanny's name! Her final resting place had been found. The words carved looked near perfect compared to others of the same period from around 137 years ago. The peat like cushioned ivy seems to have preserved the stone. Carved at each corner is a cockle shell - the Christian religious sign of pilgrimage.

Helena and I chatted about a plan to lay flowers on the anniversary of Fanny's death, we had just learnt she was 73 and died on 21<sup>st</sup> January.

A robin flew down and hopped about the gravestone eating the bugs that the soil had left. It's plumage looked a bit dishevelled; it may have been young. It was another special moment, poignant, the Clifton grave was helping to feed a small young creature. Later I fetched a bucket of water and cleaned off the remaining mud, and Fanny Clifton's gravestone gleamed like a mirror, beautifully reflecting back the blue sky, clouds and trees.


